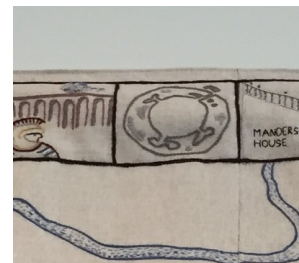

The Great Scottish Tapestry is now on display in a purpose built gallery in Galashiels and is well worth a visit. Galashiels is easily reached from Edinburgh with the new Borders Rail link to Melrose. There are 160 beautifully embroidered panels outlining key events and developments and

the lives of people in Scotland throughout history and includes the work of Marilyn and Laura among many others.

The Colour Purple

Last month Isabella Whitworth from Devon gave us a fascinating talk about The Colour Purple. She led us through an intriguing story which included the ancient Tyrian purple extracted from thousands of sea snails to provide the coveted deep purple edging the togas of wealthy Romans, her discovery and researching of the Bedford family archive relating to dye manufacturing from orchil (obtained from lichen) in Leeds in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries and the discovery of the first synthetic dye, Perkins mauve. It was a fascinating insight into dyeing history.

Gorgie Farm Spinners

Frida Bleakley is a member of Gorgie Farm Spinners and has sent some information about the group.



Until last week we operated through the open patio doors showing the public some of our yarns and items produced from our handspun yarns. Though we have not been able to tutor anyone we have had some very interesting conversation with folk who clearly had a very genuine interest in these traditional crafts. As always there is a keen interest from children and we also engage with them as regards the history of the traditional craft of spinning and some touchy feely toys for them. We are also trying to show the connection to the farm and at the moment we are spinning some of the Alpaca from their herd of Alpacas.

Until a few weeks ago our focus has been from fleece to finish basically based on members' interests. However our new recruit Sheila Syrett has brought a contemporary approach to spinning such as Art yarn, sparkles, curls and brighter colours. It's a lovely addition to the group and may in fact get more interest from younger people.

We have had a group of young women showing interest in being taught how to spin and we agreed that we may also do some natural dyeing with them. This week we have 2 people coming to learn to spin so this is a return to the more normal. I must add we are still operating with open doors and wearing masks.

We are a total membership of 7 people but 2 of our members continue to observe some degree of distancing and are not able to join us until Covid numbers have reduced further. We do not pay a rent but we each pay a small amount of money each week which provides a regular donation to Love Gorgie Farm but also enables us to obtain new equipment or get workshop tutors to assist us develop further skills. We welcome new members.

The original farm closed down late 2019 due to financial difficulties. The farm, which is now run by the charity Love Learning Scotland, reopened just before the first lockdown. During the lockdowns they have been running a food bank including some fresh vegetables from their vegetable garden. There has been a very marked positive change since the take over by Love Learning and the organisation is very diverse and inclusive both in terms of staff and the people for whom they provide a service. Love Learning work with people with Learning Difficulties and people who have missed out on education. They have developed a very strong connection with a number of local schools providing input for both teachers and the children. They also run a number of classes for children during the holiday period.

For those who live near or in Edinburgh it is a lovely day out with or without children.

Price for the Raw Fleece is £22.50 per kg (Plus £5 postage). If you would rather half a fleece that's no problem.

Washed & Carded Fibre (pure Teeswater) - this has been professionally washed & carded and is lovely to spin or felt.

Prices for the carded fibre:

100g = £7 (+£3.50 P&P)

250g = £20 (+£3.50 P&P)

500g = £35 (+£5 P&P)

1kg = £70 (inc delivery)
