## **October Meeting**

This month's meeting is on Saturday 15th October in Craiglockhart Church Hall. Trisha Gow and Marilyn Caddell will be talking about dyeing with fungi and the showing the amazing spectrum of colours which can be obtained from toadstools. Below is a beautiful display of silk scarves dyed with fungi which was exhibited by the Scottish Fungi Dye Group at the Tolbooth Gallery in Lanark in 2019.



The Weaving Interest Group will be having its first meeting at around 1pm. The topic for study is to attempt something new. A broad topic indeed! Please bring along anything you have done to share with fellow group members.

## **Last Month's Meeting**

The spinning group had its first meeting last month and discussed progress with long draw spinning. We marvelled at Erika's lighter-than-air rolag and learnt that many of us are making our rolags far too densely. Some examples of first attempts at long draw were passed around and methods for achieving success with long draw were discussed. It was decided that the group would continue trying to make progress with long draw for the time being, and that those who wanted to, would experiment with spinning from the fold prior to our next meeting in January.

After the meeting Erika circulated a link to a video showing English long draw, and alerted some of us to the fact that there was such a thing as American long draw, and that it is different to the English style. Amazing!

Jan Beadle tutored an excellent workshop introducing members to double weave. She brought warped up 4 shaft looms so that we could immediately start weaving two layers of cloth as tubes, pockets, stuffed pockets, leno and double cloth, and learning to change our top and bottom layers. We were each able to take home our woven sample at the end of the workshop.





## **November Meeting**

Unfortunately Rod Grant is no longer able to give us a talk about Spinning Wheel Maintenance in November. After some minor surgery he will not be able to drive for at least a month and regrettably he feels that, as a result of some other health issues, he is not able to commit to another date. He is now constructing his last spinning wheel and is moving on to violin building in the future. He says that he would still try to help guild members with wheel issues/ problems and would be happy to advise.

As Rod Grant's talk has been cancelled there will be a discussion about the topic for the November meeting at the meeting on Saturday.

# **National Exhibition September**


John Palmer managed to make the journey to see the National Exhibition at Leigh Spinner Mill in Lancashire last month. He says

"The Guild national exhibition at Leigh Spinners Mill was not the easiest place to get to, but the building itself - a work in progress - was fascinating and everyone was very welcoming. I loved practically everything I saw; the tapestries, a knitted gandsey, and even some quilts for my wife. Trish Gow's freeform tapestry and Penny Skett's two woven rugs stood out. Use of colour fascinates me, with this green scarf being a royal blue warp and acid yellow weft. The 'clasping technique' which produced the geometric forms is a must try, and the waterfall triptych just flows. Finally a thank you to all the volunteers at the exhibit, who were so easy to talk to and willing to share."



Endangered Threads have produced an interesting video about Maya Weaving and Textiles in Guatemala.
