November Meeting

This month's meeting is on Saturday 19th November in Craiglockhart Church Hall. Following the cancellation of our November talk on spinning wheel maintenance by Rod Grant we have a new workshop in its place, which will be run by Jane Howorth, making a wrist distaff.

Wrist Distaff Making

A wrist distaff is a handy device you can make for yourself. It's made from yarn and weighted with beads. It hangs from your wrist and can be loaded with fibre ready for drafting. It's very portable, which makes it particularly useful for spindle spinners, but can be used equally well by spinning wheel users.

This is a free class which is open to all members.

If you want to take part, you will need to bring with you a selection of yarns to use. These can be handspun and/or commercial yarns; dk, aran and/or chunky weights work best. You will also need beads, buttons, charms or other items to fasten onto the distaff, and a fine crochet hook or yarn needle for threading these items onto your yarn ends. Scissors and a medium sized crochet hook are also useful.

You can also bring some fibre, a spindle or spinning wheel if you want to try out your newlycompleted distaff straight away.

The class will start at 11.00 and will last about 2 hours.

The Dyeing Interest Group will be having its first meeting at around 1pm. After last month's fascinating talk about fungi dyeing there will be plenty to discuss!

Last Month's Meeting

Carmen Wright has sent a wonderful report on the fascinating talk given by Marilyn Caddell and Trisha Gow last month as well as sending some photographs to remind us of the beautiful examples which Marilyn and Trisha brought along to show us on the day.

"Like falling down the rabbit hole. Magical, mysterious and beautiful. That is what it felt like

listening to Marilyn Cadell and Trisha Gow's presentation on dyeing with fungi. I counted sixty four shades of browns, yellows and purples on the woven wool samples. All methodically and scientifically labelled with the typed Latin names of the foraged fungi used for dyeing the fibres. The colours are vibrant yet soft and they work well together in any combination. A labour of love. I liked that they are mindful foragers, they gather only enough fungi for the vat and no more, trying to live harmoniously within the ecosystem. So many ideas to try.
