# Ise Kategami

The Guild has another author - Carmen Wright. Carmen has published two volumes of beautiful Ise Katagami stencils on Apple Books.



<sup>&</sup>quot;About eighteen years ago I bought, on impulse at an auction, a folder with 19th century letters

with black penny stamps and 18thc Drury Lane theatre tickets and other ephemera. Or so I thought. I arrived late at the auction that day, no time to inspect the lots. There were quite a lot of antique Chinese and Japanese lots that day and I ended up buying an antique Chinese photo album, inlayed with abalone and mother of pearl, a Chinese hand painted room divider and the folio sized folder. All impulse buys. I paid for the three lots and took them home. On inspection, I found the coveted penny blacks and the hand written letters. There was also a large quantity of unusual papers, leather like, with hand carved designs of exquisite beauty and fine detail. It was only before the pandemic that I found out what those mysterious designs were! 19th century Japanese stencils, Ise katagami, used to print designs on fabric (the printing technique is called katazome). Then, in 2020, I was diagnosed with breast cancer and operated on on Hogmanay. I have felt the need, since, to express my gratitude to all the people who helped me: nurses, doctors, surgeons, researchers, to the NHS, to my husband and to my son.

I was probably the only one (in my family at least) who knew what those stencils were. They were designed to be used and discarded, but someone looked after them. They survived the centuries and arrived in Scotland and they chose me to be their guardian. I survived as well. Serendipity. Robert, our son, graduated with a digital graphic design diploma. I asked him to help me put the book together and list it on Apple Books. We acquired the book barcodes and Robert learnt about publishing while I researched Japanese fashion, history and craft printing techniques.

We tried Amazon first but they take 70% of the sales so we thought there would not be much left for our purpose, as we had decided to give 25% of the sales to Western General for research to sort out breast cancer.

The e-book is in two volumes and it contains a list with descriptions of the Edo and Meiji Japanese stencils and one hundred and twenty detailed scans of the stencils themselves. It is priced at £10.99 per volume and is available through Apple Books."

## Lady MacEwen's Tweed Loom



Mary Marshall has sent the Guild the following email -

#### "Dear EWSD

Fifty years ago, a weaver from the Black Isle gave me her tweed loom and stool. Her arthritis had become too bad for her to continue weaving and I had just returned from a summer teaching very basic weaving at a USA summer camp.

This tweed loom had some use in the 1970s and 1980s but has barely been touched since. It is 27 inches. I am now 77 and keen that it goes to a good home, ideally someone who could not afford a loom but is very keen to use one.

There are two envelopes addressed to Lady MacEwen, a Kessock Weaver, who is the person who gave it to me. There is the loom itself, a really nice seat full of shuttles etc, a bag of extra bits and pieces and a warping frame made by a friend of mine.

I do hope you can find some deserving person or organisation who can make good use of it."





Here are pictures of the stool and warping frame. Is there anyone who is interested or who knows of someone who would be interested in this historic table loom? # **Shipping Roots - Inverleith House to 27 August**

Keg de Souza is resident artist at the Royal Botanic Gardens and she explores the 'colonial legacy of plants' in an exhibition at Inverleith House. In her installation 'Fleece Fugitives' she highlights how the import of wool from Australia resulted in seeds tangled in the fleeces being accidentally carried across the seas. The introduced 'plants' then spread out from Scotland's woollen mills.

The exhibition includes some beautifully dyed samples.
